#### **KEYNOTE PRESENTATION** (9:00 - 10:30 AM)

#### KEVIN MULCAHY - "Randy & Me"

Randy & Me recounts Kevin's own story of sexual exploitation at the hands of his soccer coach, Randy. But, it will not be merely a retelling of the past. Instead, the presentation will address lessons learned from his case by combining Kevin's experience both as a victim and a long-time prosecutor of child exploitation cases. Knowing what he knows now, Kevin believes there are lessons to be learned from his story for the investigator (Kevin's was great), the prosecutor (Kevin's was terrible), and the forensic interviewer (Kevin did not have one). Beyond these (hopefully) useful lessons, the presentation will provide plenty of time for questions from attendees. Given the nature of our work, we don't often get to ask questions (beyond factual questions) of our child victims.

#### **SESSION 2** (10:45 AM- 12:15 PM)

#### A) JEFF RICH - "Interviews and Interrogations for MDT members"

This course of instruction will cover the basics of Interviews and a historical perspective on methods used and how these methods are changing over time as well as time tested techniques used in Child Exploitation investigations. The course is intended for members of an MDT and will cover in-depth interviews (with examples) as well.

### B) JOAN PERNECKE - "How the Work of CAC's Impact the Prosecution of Child Abuse and Neglect Cases"

After an investigation is complete, prosecutors determine if criminal charges against an adult offender will be filed, if a Delinquency Petition against a minor offender will be filed and if a Child Protection (Abuse and Neglect) Civil Petition will be filed. Evidence can include medical examinations and statements to medical providers, statements of victims, witnesses and offenders, photographs and scene investigations. Evidence gathered can include prior investigations and their result, as well as prior statements. With a coordinated MDT approach, a better investigation will result. The benefit to the prosecutor is that there is often just one source of investigational material, and an Advocacy Center that has created a relationship of trust with the child victim and their non-offending caretakers. I will discuss the benefits & the difficulties that often accompany an investigation that is not handled through the CAC.

### C) JEFFREY WHERRY - "NCA Standards for Family Advocacy: The Family Advocate Role as One Remedy/Response to Engagement"

NCA Accreditation Standards for Family Advocates require training in: (a) dynamics of abuse (b) trauma-informed services (c) crisis assessment and intervention (d) risk assessment and safety planning. This workshop will focus on using knowledge in the aforementioned areas to strengthen engagement, and to support children by supporting their non-offending parents.

#### **SESSION 3** (1:15 – 2:45 PM)

#### A) JEFF RICH - "Technology Facilitated Child Abuse Investigations"

During this course of instruction students will be exposed to methods and techniques offenders are using to facilitate the exploitation of children as well as methods used by Law Enforcement and Social Services to utilize these same exploits as evidence against the offender. This course will cover an overview of technology but is suited for the technologically challenged as well.

#### B) ALE LEVI - "Identifying, Notification, and Interviewing All In One"

More and more common is the case where your suspect/target is enticing minors to self-produce pictures of themselves, producing images/videos of them without their knowledge, using sextortion methods or baiting them in with a false identity. We will discuss new investigative techniques regarding how to locate victims while minimizing impact on the victim and family; how and when to identify the victims of child exploitation; and how to notify the families of the child exploitation through the use of the forensic interview process. These techniques are helpful with cases ranging from one victim to those with multi-victims spanning the globe. Discussions of protocols and venues for these options will be presented using case examples as well as presenters experience.

## C) JEFFREY WHERRY - "Prepare for the New NCA Standards on Mental Health Assessment: Best Practices in Training"

New NCA Accreditation Standards for Mental Health require: a) trauma-specific assessment of traumatic events and abuse-related trauma symptoms b) use of standardized assessment measures initially to inform treatment, and to assess progress/outcome and c) individualized treatment planning based on assessments that are re-assessed. Currently, these services are seldom provided, and few staff/community providers are familiar or proficient with standardized measures. An assessment model will be presented that includes existing and promising measures, examples of using information to prioritize treatment needs/match with evidence-based treatments, and how to periodically re-assess. Lessons learned from training models in Texas and Mississippi will be discussed.

### D) CLAUDIA KASTEN & EVAN OWENS - "Illinois Prosecutor Panel and Round Table"

This panel will focus on the important role of the prosecutor on the MDT and discuss timely topics for child abuse investigations. Be prepared to meet your colleagues and brainstorm ideas as attendees have the opportunity to address your questions. Learn about challenges your colleagues face and how they overcome those issues. **FOR PROSECUTORS ONLY** 

#### **SESSION 4** (3:00 – 4:30 PM)

## A) JEFF RICH - "Preparing the MDT to Respond to Child Sex Trafficking Cases"

This course of instruction will provide information on how an MDT can identify current and prospective members of the MDT for CST cases as well as describing the best practices teams will need to take to ensure success.

## B) DR. VEENA RAMAIAH - "What All Investigators Should Ask on the Scene for Proper Medical Evaluations: Burns, Fractures, and Head Injury"

This presentation will focus on the core components of the history and scene investigation in physical abuse investigations. The information obtained by investigators is often crucial for assisting the medical provider in determining mechanism or manner of injury. The focus will be on the 4 main areas of injury seen in physical abuse: Head Trauma, Fractures, Burns, and Bruises. Checklists for each injury or diagnosis will be presented that may help guide the investigator as you initiate or proceed through an investigation.

## C) JEFFREY WHERRY - "Evidence-Based Treatments for Use in A CAC Setting: Introduction and Overview"

NCA Accreditation Standards for Family Advocates require training in: (a) dynamics of abuse (b) trauma-informed services (c) crisis assessment and intervention (d) risk assessment and safety planning. This workshop will focus on using knowledge in the aforementioned areas to strengthen engagement and to support children by supporting their non-offending parents.



#### **KEYNOTE PRESENTATION** (9:00 - 10:30 AM)

#### DAN POWERS - "It's Not Easy Being Green or Doing THIS for a Living.....Wellness/Survival and the MDT Approach to Child Abuse"

This motivational talk is meant to provide you with the insight & knowledge to help survive in a job no ones else really understands. Others "outside the business" don't want to hear about this stuff! You can clear a restaurant with a discussion of what you did that day. We see & hear things on a daily basis our mom & dad never told you existed in this world. Participants will learn how dynamic determination & working, as a member of THE TEAM, will help you survive in "our world". Based on the wisdom of Kermit the Frog, participants will be encouraged to look at themselves, why they do "this" for a living & most of all learn to laugh at it all.

#### **SESSION 2** (10:45 AM- 12:15 PM)

## A) DAN POWERS - "Juvenile Sex Offenders and Reunification, a Challenge for the Team"

Juvenile sex offenders pose an interesting challenge to the MDT. This workshop is intended for interviewers, police officers, CPS workers, medical personnel, family court workers, attorneys, judges, social workers, therapists & anyone else dealing with juvenile sex offenders. We will explore the dynamics & challenges juvenile sex offenders bring to your caseload. We will review types of juvenile sex offenders and will suggest a consistent approach in dealing with them from investigation through on-going treatment. It will emphasize the MDT approach as solution to solving the unique problems these cases bring to the system.

### B) KEVIN McNEIL - "Investigating Child Sex Crimes and Why Your Involvement Matters"

This workshop is for multi-disciplinary teams. It is designed to show why every investigation should be done as a team and not just by a lone investigator. It will also highlight evidence some investigators do not consider.

#### C) KAREN HANGARTNER - "Individual Strategies to Address Work Related Trauma Exposure"

This workshop will explore strategies that individuals can use to mitigate the negative effects of working with children and families who have experienced trauma. Working with children and families who have experienced trauma can have a profound impact on professionals. In this workshop participants will discuss concepts of vicarious trauma, secondary traumatic stress and compassion fatigue. We will explore specific strategies professionals can use to promote resilience.

#### **SESSION 3** (1:15 – 2:45 PM)

#### A) DAN POWERS - "Leadership on the MDT"

Do you want to be known as the Yoda or Darth to your staff? Would you like to convey wisdom or deliver fear as part of your leadership style? You cannot deny that Darth Vader's leadership style gets results, but force choking may not be the best way to lead your team. As leaders in "our world" we are faced with the challenge of needing to influence many different types of people. The team looks to you to lead with knowledge, compassion and empathy. You have a choice, use the force or go to the dark side.

#### B) CARLA STALNAKER & ERICKA SANDERS - "Juvenile Pre-Trial Assessments: Effective Sentencing Based Upon the Needs of the Child"

Ever wonder what role childhood trauma plays in juvenile delinquency? Are you curious how the juvenile justice system sentences are determined? The Clinton County juvenile justice system team has developed a new and innovative way to answer both questions. In 2015, the Clinton County Juvenile Court implemented an innovative pre-trial protocol to better identify childhood trauma in our youth and to utilize this information in sentencing. The pre-trial protocol, by utilizing the ACE (Adverse Childhood Experiences) Questionnaire and the YASI (Youth Assessment & Screening Instrument), is one of the first of its kind. The pre-trial assessments have shown to be beneficial in providing evidence based sentencing, deterring inappropriate incarceration, and identifying a youth's risks and needs to provide more effective supervision planning. This presentation will address the legal, professional, and personal issues in developing and implementing such a protocol. It will discuss the day-to day implementation of the pre-trial assessments and the benefits the youth and system have seen as a result.

## C) KAREN HANGARTNER - "MDT Strategies to Address Work Related Trauma Exposure"

This workshop will look at concrete strategies multidisciplinary teams and supervisors can employ to mitigate the negative effects of working with children and families who have experienced trauma. Working with children and families who have experienced trauma can have a profound impact on professionals. Often, there is the expectation that individuals are solely responsible for their own self-care. In reality, there is a responsibility on the part of the organization to develop policies and procedures to educate, promote and support employees in order to mitigate the negative effects of trauma exposure. In this workshop, we will look at research around vicarious trauma, secondary traumatic stress and compassion fatigue from an organizational perspective. We will explore creative, concrete solutions that MDTs may use to create healthy environments, which will promote resilience among team members.

#### **SESSION 4** (3:00 – 4:30 PM)

#### A) DAN POWERS - "Working With Non-Offending Caregivers in Sexual Abuse Cases"

This workshop is intended for interviewers, police officers, CPS workers, probation officers, attorneys, judges, social workers, therapists and anyone else dealing with abused children and their non-offending parents. It will review types of non-offending parents and suggest a consistent approach in dealing with them from investigation through on-going treatment. Your actions can "make or break it" for the next professional dealing with the parent. We will discuss the range of emotions professionals may feel as well as the "do's and don'ts" of dealing with non-offending parents, emphasizing the need for a collaborative, consistent approach when dealing with them.

## B) KEVIN McNEIL - "Collecting Evidence in Child Abuse Investigations: Going Beyond the Allegation"

Over the past decade reports of child abuse & child sex crimes have increased dramatically. Due to the nature of the crime & the fact some victim's delay in reporting, proving these cases can be challenging. In most cases there are no objective witnesses to the crime; only the victim. Often times this only leaves the investigator & child service providers with only the statement of the child victim. In this workshop Det. McNeil gives helpful information & tips on how to collect evidence beyond the original victim statement. He will discuss how to build a case around the allegation & search for other things to support the allegation. Detective McNeil will also discuss why it is important to gather information outside of the child victim's home. The purpose of this workshop is to help investigator and child service providers build stronger cases that involve only allegations.

## C) KAREN HANGARTNER - "Research to Practice: Hot Topics for Multidisciplinary Teams"

This research to practice workshop will explore recent research that affects child abuse investigations. Child abuse professionals on MDTs need working knowledge of research findings related to child abuse and possible effects on investigations. This specific information is seldom, if ever, included in their discipline-specific professional training. There are several topics that directly impact decisions made during the course of an investigation and may affect recommendations for interventions. In this workshop, we explore several "hot" topics and related research and implications for professionals' practice.





**KEVIN MULCAHY** is a survivor of child sexual abuse. He works as an Assistant U.S. Attorney in Detroit, Michigan & serves as Chief of the General Crimes Unit. As Chief, he oversees the Project Safe Childhood program, as well as supervising gun, drug & other federal prosecutions. For his own caseload, Kevin focuses on child exploitation crimes, including production of child pornography cases, traveler cases, & other significant PSC prosecutions. Kevin has been a prosecutor for 13 1/2 years, all on the federal level, with the first 3 1/2 years as an AUSA in San Diego & the rest in Detroit. Kevin obtained his undergraduate degree in Statistics & American Culture from the University of Michigan & his JD from Santa Clara School of Law. He has 3 kids, 2 cats, 1 dog, & a very nice wife.



**DET. JEFF RICH** has been assigned to the Plano (Texas) Police Department's Family Violence Unit, housed at the CAC of Collin County, as a child abuse & violent crimes investigator, since 2000. As a member of the MDT, Jeff has investigated more than 4,500 child abuse & child exploitation cases. Additionally, Jeff investigates internet crimes against children & conducts online child exploitation investigations as a Special Deputy U.S. Marshal assigned to the F.B.I.'s Innocent Images Task Force In this capacity, Jeff also serves on the Technical Development Team of the F.B.I.'s VCAC to aid in the development and implementation the tools used worldwide to investigate these offenses. Jeff received the Child Advocate of the Year award from the CAC of Collin County & was presented with the U.S. Department of Justice Eagle Award for his efforts in the investigation of online crimes against children. In 2010, he was awarded the U.S. Department of Justice William French Smith Award for his work towards online child exploitation investigations.



JOAN PERNECKE has been an Assistant State's Attorney in Cook County, Illinois since January 1989. Since 2007 she has been the Chief of the Child Protection Division of the Juvenile Justice Bureau, in which 12 full-time courtrooms and 3 adjunct courtrooms handle all Child Protection Prosecutions, both initial and TPR Petitions. Her Division is responsible for screening cases brought by DCFS, hospitals and others & filing Petitions as appropriate. During her career with the State's Attorneys Office, she has tried 80 juries, including 39 murders & was the coordinator of the first group of dedicated domestic violence courtrooms from 1989-1992 & has served long-term as Faculty for the DePaul University College of Law Trial Advocacy courses, as well as for the National College of District Attorneys in South Carolina, & the American Prosecutors Research Institute.



**JEFFREY N. WHERRY, Ph.D., ABPP** completed his Ph.D. at the University of Southern Mississippi & earned the Diplomate in Clinical Psychology awarded by the American Board of Professional Psychology. He has worked with residential populations, foster children & with outpatients. Jeff was the CEO of Children's Advocacy Services of Greater St. Louis, where he also was involved in training, outpatient work with sexually abused children & research. He has been a tenured professor at four universities & he directed the Research Institute of the Dallas CAC. Jeff was named as an "Integrated Scholar" at Texas Tech University & received the "Outstanding Professional Award" in 2013 from the American Professional Society on the Abuse of Children. His interests include sexual abuse, PTSD, assessment & treatment. Jeff has published over 40 journal articles; made over 250 presentations; & received foundation & grant support in excess of \$5.0 million. He and his wife of 39 years have one delightful daughter, a wonderful son-in-law & 2 adorable granddaughters.

**ALEXANDRA "ALE" LEVI** is the lead Forensic Interview Specialist (FIS), for Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) and has conducted nearly 5000 victim interviews. Ms. Levi is an LCSW and holds her Masters in Social Work and Forensic Psychology, and has worked in the area of child abuse/exploitation since 1998. In 2009, Ms. Levi became the first FIS for HSI and established guidelines and protocols for the HSI Forensic Interview Program. She works with all victims of crime, focusing on child exploitation; cyber and technology facilitate crimes, human trafficking and child sex tourism. As the sole Spanish speaking FIS for the federal government, Ms. Levi travels both domestically and internationally conducting forensic interviews and trainings in English and Spanish. In addition to her work as an FIS for HIS, Ms. Levi has also assisted other federal agencies such as the Department of State and the FBI both domestically and internationally.

**CLAUDIA KASTEN** is Chief of the Juvenile Division of the Lake County State's Attorney's Office. She served as an Assistant State's Attorney from 1986 to 1991 and was appointed Chief of the Juvenile Trial Division serving from 1991 to 1994. In 1994 she became Chief of the Misdemeanor & Traffic Trial Divisions until 1998 when she became Chief of Special Investigations & was reassigned to Chief of Juvenile in fall of 2006. Ms. Kasten was on the Board of "A Safe Place," a domestic violence shelter, from 1994 – 2001 and served on the Board of the Lake County CAC. She is a member of the Lake County Domestic Violence Council, the Juvenile Justice Council &the Lake County Underage Drinking Prevention Task Force, the Lake County Juvenile Officer's Association & the Lake County Sex Offender Management Board. Recently, she became a member of the Board for the Lake County After School Coalition.

**EVAN OWENS** has been admitted to the practice of law in the State of Illinois since 1994. Mr. Owens was appointed as Franklin County State's Attorney in December of 2010 by the Franklin County Board and was first sworn in as State's Attorney on December 27, 2010. Mr. Owens was elected by Franklin County to serve as State's Attorney for the current term on March 20, 2012. Mr. Owens also currently serves on the State of Illinois Children's Justice Task Force.



**VEENA RAMAIAH, MD** is a pediatric emergency medicine physician and a child abuse pediatrician. She is currently an assistant professor of Pediatrics at University of Chicago Comer Children's Hospital. She has been faculty at the University of Chicago since 2000 where she began her career in pediatric emergency medicine. Over the years, she developed an interest in child abuse and neglect and became board certified in this subspecialty in 2013. She has been part of the Child Advocacy and Protective Services team since 2003. Currently, she splits her time 50/50 between PEM and CAPS. This involves clinical shifts in Comer ER and inpatient consultation for child abuse and neglect. Her primary academic focus is as a clinician-educator.



**DAN POWERS** LCSW is a clinical social worker and currently serves as Senior Vice President & Clinical Director for CAC of Collin County in Plano, Texas. He supervises a staff of 22 therapists & clinical interns providing no cost services to victims of child abuse and family violence as well as their nonoffending family members. As Senior VP he is responsible for clinical operations and program development as well as directing the Advocacy Center's clinical internship and training program. Dan has over 25 years of experience working within the field of child abuse, sex offenders & family violence. He frequently testifies as an expert witness in state & federal courts. He has been appointed by the governor on two occasions to state agency boards and is currently the Chair Elect of the Texas Children's Justice Act Task Force. Dan has made numerous presentations at major national and regional conferences on the sexual victimization of children, sex offenders, and the multidisciplinary response to child abuse. He is best known for his spirited presentations on wellness and survival for child abuse and family violence professionals. Dan lives in North Texas with his wife and two sons.



**KEVIN McNEIL** is an author, motivational speaker, empowerment coach and owner of the motivational speaker company, Believe. With over ten years of experience in public speaking, McNeil is an energetic and powerful speaker. For over 18 years, McNeil has served as a Law Enforcement Officer in Georgia at the DeKalb County PD, with 10 of those years dedicated as a Special Victims Detective investigating child maltreatment, domestic abuse and sex crimes.



KAREN HANGARTNER, LGSW is Project Director for the Southern Regional Children's Advocacy Center. She holds a BS degree in Psychology from Athens State University & Masters in Social Work from The University of Alabama. She has been with the National Children's Advocacy Center since 2003, spending four years in the Prevention department before beginning work with the Southern Regional CAC. As Deputy Project Director for SRCAC, Karen is responsible for developing & delivering training for CACS and MDTS across 16 states & the District of Columbia. She has conducted more than 150 trainings for MDTs & CACs in the Southern region. She also presents at state and national conferences on a variety of topics including, Secondary Traumatic Stress, Trauma Informed Multidisciplinary Teams, Team Functioning, Leading in a Multidisciplinary Environment, Grant Writing, & Conflict on Teams. She also works with regional and national partners on collaborative projects. Prior to joining the NCAC staff, Karen served as Children's Minister at First Baptist Church in Huntsville, Alabama.

**CARLA STALNAKER** Carla has been the Juvenile Probation Officer in Clinton County for 16 years. She has a B.S. degree in Adolescent Psychology. Her previous experience includes 8 years at Hoyleton Children's Home where she worked with behavior disordered, developmentally delayed, and sex offender youth in a residential placement setting. Carla has been a member of Illinois Probation and Court Services Association since 2000 and was named Probation Officer of the Year in 2015. She is certified to facilitate several different cognitive-behavioral groups. Carla was appointed to the 4<sup>th</sup> Judicial Circuit Juvenile Justice Council in 2014. Carla was instrumental in implementing the ACE Questionnaire and pre-trial assessments in Clinton County.

**ERICKA SANDERS** is an Associate Judge from Marion County, Illinois, appointed in 2010. She serves as the chair of the Fourth Circuit's Juvenile Justice Counsel, which strives to bring trauma-informed practices to every discipline in each of the Circuit's nine counties. She is the Problem-Solving Court judge in Effingham, Illinois, presiding over the drug, mental health & veteran's court. She is also the drug court judge in Clinton County, has the juvenile calls in Marion & Clinton counties & leads the Student & Family Education Court, a truancy diversion project, based upon the drug court model, at the Centralia Junior High & in the grade school & high school in Sandoval, Illinois. After graduating from Southern Illinois University School of Law in 1998, Sanders became a staff attorney with Land of Lincoln Legal Aid & then an Assistant Public Defender in Marion County. Sanders moved on to the General Law Bureau, civil defense division, at the Attorney General's Office in Springfield & worked there for three years before returning to Marion County to be the Lead Public Defender. She was a topic editor of the civil procedure bench book & serves on the executive board of the Illinois Association of Problem Solving Courts. Sanders lives in Centralia, Illinois with her husband, twin babies, many dogs & one cat.
